Book:

Author's Lastname, Firstname. Title of Book. City: Publisher, Publication year.

(**Note:** If there is more than one author, subsequent authors are listed
Firstname, Lastname, separated by commas.)

Example:

Carpenter, Humphrey, and Mari Prichard. Oxford Companion to Children's Literature.
Oxford: Oxford University Press, 1984.

Article from a Scholarly Journal:

Author's Lastname, Firstname. "Title of Article." Name of Journal Vol# (publication year): page numbers.

(**Note:** Add issue number after volume if a publication begins numbering
the pages of each issue with page 1. See Example #2 below.)

Example:

Templin, Charlotte. "Marietta Holley and Mark Twain: Cultural-Gender Politics and Literary
Reputation." American Studies 39 (1998): 75-92.

Example #2:

Smith, Johanna M. "Constructing the Nation: Eighteenth-Century Geographies for Children."
Mosaic 34.2 (2001): 133-48.

Article from a Magazine:

Author's Lastname, Firstname. "Title of Article." Name of Magazine Publication date: article pages.

(**Note:** If the periodical is published once weekly or every other week,
give the publication date as day month year;
if it is published monthly or less frequently,
give the month (or other designation) and year)

Example:

Weintraub, Arlene, and Laura Cohen. "A Thousand-Year Plan for Nuclear Waste."
Business Week 6 May 2002: 94-96.

Article from a Newspaper:

Author's Lastname, Firstname. "Title of Article." Title of Newspaper Publication Date, edition.: page
numbers.

(**Note:** If the article is not printed on consecutive pages type
the first page number and then a plus sign. See below.)

Example:

Jeromack, Paul. "This Once, a David of the Art World Does Goliath a Favor."
New York Times 13 July 2002, late ed.: B7+

Article – Reprinted in a Collection:

The basic citation will be exactly as the citation for a scholarly journal, magazine or newspaper above.

To this add the following:

1. Rpt in.
2. The title of the collection.
3. The publication facts of the collection.

Example:

Holladay, Hillary. "Narrative Space in Ann Petry's Country Place." Xavier Review 16 (1996): 21-35. Rpt. in Twentieth-Century Literary Criticism. Ed. Linda Pavlovski and Scott Darga. Vol. 112. Detroit: Gale, 2002. 356-62.

Article - Online:

The basic citation will be exactly as the citation for a scholarly journal, magazine or newspaper above.

To this add the following:

1. Name of the index where the article was found.
2. Name of the library subscribing to the index.
3. Date of access.
4. Web address of the index.

Example:

Samway, Patrick. "Lucas Beauchamp: an Unpublished Story." Virginia Quarterly Review 75.3 (1999): 417-419. EBSCO. Sprague Library, Montclair State University, Montclair, NJ. 18 Jan. 2000. <<http://search.epnet.com>>

Encyclopedia or Dictionary Entry:

Author's name (if given). "Title of Entry." Title of Whole Work. Ed. Editor's Firstname Lastname. Edition number, number of volumes in set. City: Publisher, Publication year.

Example:

"Milk." def. 2. Dictionary of American English. Ed. William S. Craigie and James R. Hulbert. 4 vols. Chicago: University of Chicago Press, 1942.

Work in an Anthology:

Author of cited work Lastname, Firstname. "Title of Part Cited." Title of Anthology. Ed. Editor's Firstname Lastname. City: Publisher, Publication year. Pages of cited work.

Example:

Udall, Nicholas. "Ralph Roister Doister." Five Pre-Shakespearean Comedies. Ed. Frederick S. Boas. London: Oxford University Press, 1970. 113-126.

Internet / World Wide Web:

Name of author or editor. "Title of Work." Publication information for any print version of source. Title of scholarly project, database, periodical. Version number, if relevant, or volume and issue number of periodical. Date of electronic publication. Name of sponsoring institution or organization. Date of access. <Internet address>

Example:

"African-American Sheet Music 1850-1920." American Memory. 10 September 1999. Library of Congress. 6 May 2005
